Liontown identifies 2km-long lithium trend just 60km from Kidman's world-class discovery in WA

Drilling at the highly promising Lake Percy Lithium Project near Southern Cross to start early next month

Highlights

- Geochemistry identifies strong lithium oxide anomalies over a 2km strike length at the Lake Percy Lithium Project
- Anomalies coincident with pegmatites which locally exceed 100m true thickness.
- Highly anomalous lithium oxide grades of up to 354ppm, indicating strong potential for the pegmatite to contain spodumene.
- Lake Percy located just ~60km east of the world-class Earl Grey lithium discovery being developed by Kidman Resources (ASX:KDR)
- Maiden reverse circulation drilling program at Lake Percy is scheduled to commence in early February 2017

Liontown Resources Limited (ASX: LTR) is pleased to advise that geochemistry has revealed a highly promising lithium oxide anomaly at its Lake Percy Lithium Project near Southern Cross in WA.

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


Figure 1: Lake Percy Project – Soil image showing strong lithium anomalism coincident with mapped pegmatites

The anomalous trend, which contains values of up to 354ppm Li_2O , has been outlined over a strike length of 2km and is coincident with pegmatites which locally exceed 100m true thickness (**Figure 1**).

Lake Percy is located ~440km east of Perth near Poseidon Nickel's Lake Johnson/Maggie Hayes treatment plant in WA. It is also just 60km from the world-class Earl Grey lithium deposit discovered by Kidman Resources.

This emerging Forresteria Lithium Province also includes the Mt Cattlin spodumene mine (currently being commissioned by Galaxy Resources) and the Mount Day lithium discovery, which is located 20km to the south in the same greenstone belt as Lake Percy (**Figure 2**).

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Liontown's work at its Bynoe Project in the NT has shown that soil geochemical anomalism of the size and tenor illustrated in **Figure 1** can lead to the discovery of primary lithium mineralisation in drilling. For example, recent drilling at Bynoe beneath lower soil values than those recorded at Lake Percy has intersected significant widths (>20m) of >1% Li₂O mineralisation (see ASX release dated 30 September 2016).

In light of the strong anomaly identified at Lake Percy, Liontown has scheduled a maiden RC drilling program to start early next month.

Liontown Lithium Portfolio

The Lake Percy Project is subject to a Joint Venture Agreement with White Cliff Minerals whereby Liontown can earn 70% equity by sole funding exploration expenditure totaling \$1.75million within a 4 year period.

Liontown has two other active lithium projects which are wholly owned or where the Company has rights to acquire 100%:

- The **Bynoe Lithium Project**, located in the Northern Territory close to Darwin, where two phases of reverse circulation (RC) drilling completed in 2016 discovered primary lithium mineralisation in a historic pegmatite field which had previously been mined for tin and tantalum. Work by Liontown and other parties in the area has continued to enhance the lithium potential of the region with three new targets identified by recent soil sampling yet to be drill tested; and
- The **Kathleen Valley Project**, located in the Eastern Goldfields of Western Australia 680km northeast of Perth, where mapping and sampling has defined a large spodumene-bearing pegmatite swarm with high grade lithium (>2% Li₂O) and tantalum (>250ppm Ta₂O₅) values recorded at surface. Individual pegmatite trends have been defined over 1.4km strike with widths up to 30m. There has been no previous testing of the swarm and Liontown is currently working on securing heritage clearances to enable initial drilling to commence.
