Substantial and Strategic Land Position

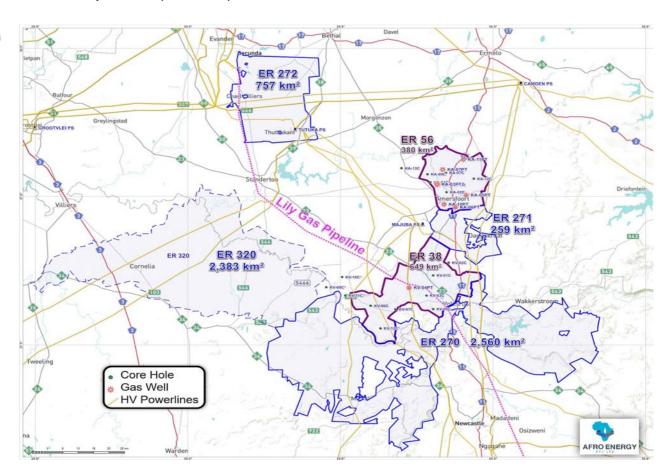


Figure 1. Afro Energy Exploration Rights & Application

Perth-based energy exploration company Kinetiko Energy Limited (ASX: "KKO" or "Kinetiko") is pleased to report on corporate developments and its activities at the Amersfoort Project and adjacent tenements in South Africa (Figure 1) during for the financial year ending 30 June 2020. Activities at the Amersfoort Project are carried out through Afro Energy (Pty) Ltd ("AE"), owned by Kinetiko (49%) and its South African shareholder Badimo Gas (Pty) Ltd ("Badimo") (51%).

Renewal of exploration rights ER38 & ER56

Following co-operation from Badimo, AE successfully submitted renewal applications for the Amersfoort exploration rights ER38 and ER56. AE received final confirmation of the award of the renewals for the two exploration rights by the Department of Mineral Resources ("**DMR**") together comprising 1,029 km² for a further two-year period in early January 2020.

Grant of new exploration rights ER270, ER271 and ER272

AE was granted new exploration rights ER270, ER271 and ER272 for an initial two-year period. The exploration rights were formally granted in mid-January 2020 and together comprised 3,576km² of mainly contiguous land rights surrounding significant existing energy infrastructure. A further application for exploration right 320 remains ungranted and the Company expects the application to be granted over the next 6 months.

Approval of environmental audit for exploration rights ER38, ER56, ER270, ER271 and ER 272

Amendments to Regulation 54(A)(2) of the EIA regulations required all rights and permits issued in terms of the Mineral and Petroleum Resources Development Act and associated Environmental Management Programs to be subjected to auditing by a registered environmental practitioner. In this regard AE appointed SLR Consulting (South Africa) (Pty) Ltd ("SLR") as the independent environmental consultant to conduct the environmental audit for Exploration Rights ER38, ER56, ER270, ER271 & ER272. The audits were successfully concluded by SLR and approved by PASA during the period.

Finalisation of audited financial accounts for AE

Kinetiko and Badimo completed the outstanding audited financial accounts for AE enabling Kinetiko to restate the value of its investment in AE to \$7.4m in the 31 December 2019 Financial Report.

Re-quotation of securities

Kinetiko successfully achieved the re-quotation of its securities following the renewal and granting of the Exploration Rights and completion of the outstanding AE audits on 18 April 2020 with a market capitalisation of \$10.85m and the market capitalisation at the end of the period was \$23.8m and is currently approximately \$40m.

Updated Independent Resource Certification

On 17 June 2020, the Company announced the appointment of independent international oil and gas appraisers and certifiers Gustavson Associates LLP ("Gustavson") from Boulder, Colorado to undertake an evaluation of the Company's exploration rights in preparation of a resource report according to the VALMIN standards and update the Company's current resource certification.

The last report produced by Gustavson in August 2012 for the overall project area provided a certified (2C) (gross) Contingent Resource of 1.5 TCF and Prospective Resource Gas In Place of 2.4 TCF (ASX Announcement 12 August 2012).

New information available to be considered by Gustavson included the expansion of the addressable geology through the recently granted exploration rights ER270, ER271 and ER272 which hosts contiguous coal geology similar to that drilled on the Amersfoort project. In addition, during the second half of 2018 world leaders in gas process control and pumping systems Endress Hauser and Franklin Electrical conducted gas flow and pressure testing on well KA-03PT situated on ER56. The results of these tests established an improved 95% recovery of gas from produced groundwater from equipment previously used and a higher methane purity content.

Subsequent to the year end, Gustavson produced an updated resource report according to the VALMIN/PRMS standards which increased the existing (gross) Prospective Resource Gas In Place estimate (GIP) from 2.4 TCF to 9.3 TCF and certified (gross) Contingent Resource (2C) from 1.5 TCF to 4.9 TCF (refer to ASX Announcement 29 July 2020)

The Gustavson report upgrades to Gas In Place, Prospective and Contingent Resources is a core element of the Company's strategy to continue to explore and assess the most gas prone areas within the 4,604kms2 of exploration rights currently held and later assess a further 2,394Km2 of rights under application which the company is seeking to have granted.

This significant milestone confirms the huge scale of the Afro Energy exploration rights and further rights still to be assessed.

High Resolution Aeromagnetic Survey - Exploration Rights 38 & 56

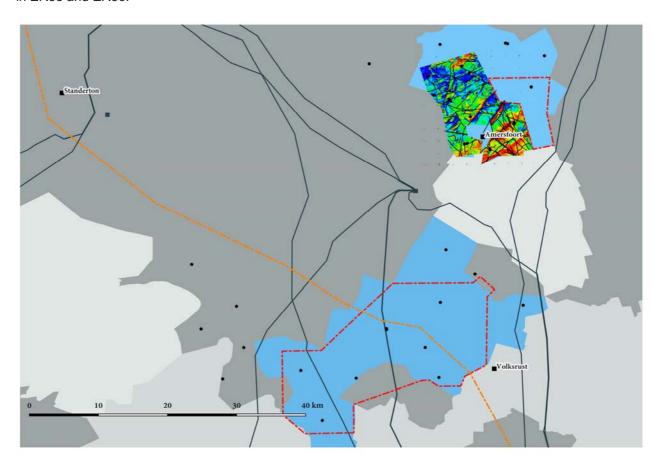


Figure 2. High-resolution aeromagnetic survey

Afro Energy initiated and prepared work programs consisting of a 1,334 line-kilometre high-resolution aeromagnetic survey on ER56 (60km²) and a 10,229 line-kilometre high-resolution aeromagnetic survey on ER38 (460km²) (Figure 2) over pre-defined areas within ER38 and ER56. The aeromagnetic survey in ER56 was planned to supplement the 145 km² previously obtained in the area. The positioning will be predicated on the results of the aeromagnetic survey and its interpretation. A further phase will then be scheduled for the drilling of 14 wells within ER38 and ER56, also under the currently approved EMP with the positioning determined by the outcome of the aeromagnetic survey and the geological interpretation of the interval well drilling program.

Additionally, Afro Energy successfully obtained the necessary support from over 400 landowners and farmers unions, which is a pre-condition prior to any airborne survey.

Afro Energy contracted Xcalibur Airborne Geophysics (Pty) Ltd to conduct the high resolution aeromagnetic and radiometric survey over the pre-defined areas within ER38 and ER56.

Subsequent to year end the survey was completed with initial results being announced to ASX on 24 September 2020. The 11,563 line kilometre aeromagnetic survey flown over two areas within ER38 and ER56 covering 520km² of the Amersfoort Project has provided further major enhancements to the imaging and interpretation of the gas prone stratigraphy. Initial interpretation of the latest aeromagnetic surveys has identified a potential 18 new geologically defined compartments analogous to the gas prone compartments in ER38 and ER56.

Exploration Right 320

PASA has positively assessed Afro Energy's application for Exploration Rights, in terms of Section 79 of the Mineral and Petroleum Resources Development Act, to explore for Petroleum and Gas. Afro Energy appointed an Environmental Assessment Practitioner, SLR to prepare the application for Environmental Authorization in terms of Regulation 16 of the Environmental Impact Assessment Regulations of 2014. Work conducted by SLR has temporarily been interrupted until conflicting regulations between PASA, DMR, the Department of Environmental Affairs and the Department of Water and Sanitation have been resolved. AE has successfully applied for an extension of the date of submission for the EIA and EMPR to PASA to allow the relevant authorities to clarify the regulations and its related guidelines.

For the time being, the submission date of the EIA and EMPR has been rescheduled by PASA for a time in line with the resolution of the conflicting regulations between the Departments.

COVID-19 Pandemic

The COVID-19 coronavirus ("COVID -19") pandemic in South Africa was declared a national disaster on 15 March 2020.

On 23 March 2020, South Africa announced a new measure to combat the spread of COVID-19 in the country – a three-week nationwide lockdown with severe restrictions on travel and movement from 26 March 2020 to 16 April 2020. The South African government subsequently amended State of National Disaster Regulations for the Alert Level 5 lockdown regulations to continue the implementation thereof to 30 April 2020.

Cabinet subsequently determined that the alert level for the whole country should be lowered to Level 3 with effect from 1 June 2020. The implementation of alert level 3 involved the return to operation of most sectors of the economy, subject to observance of strict health protocols and social distancing rules.

During Alert Levels 4 and 5 in South Africa, Kinetiko was in the planning phase for its upcoming exploration activities. Activities related to the exploration program commenced within Alert Level 3 during June 2020. The company during this period was able to house its Field Manager on site to ensure any appropriate maintenance was carried out as and when required to its existing wells. The Company has successfully conducted planned exploration and anticipates that it can continue observing the COVID-19 restrictions currently in place in South Africa.

Corporate

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Kinetiko has continued to promote the potential of the Amersfoort project to be developed as a stand-alone onshore gas producer where South Africa continues to be subject to constrained and affordable energy.

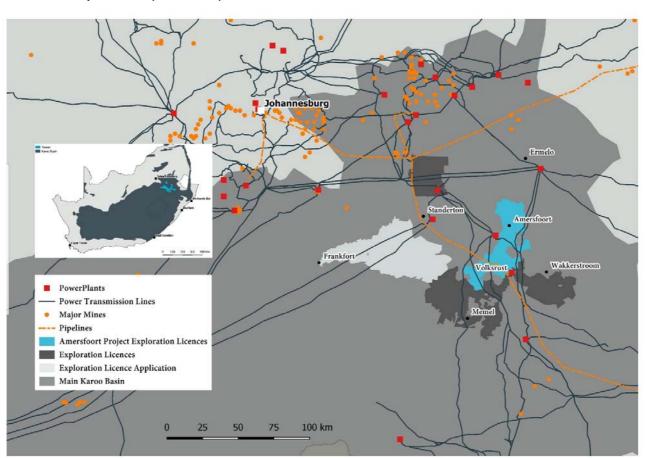


Figure 3. Kinetiko rights in Karoo coal basin surrounded by energy infrastructure

Recent achievements and the ongoing development of the Afro Energy joint venture have elicited a number of positive responses from potential funding institutions both inside South Africa and abroad to fund and participate in the Amersfoort project development and in particular the potential development of a pilot production field. The vast exploration acreage of the Amersfoort project and its location adjacent to existing energy infrastructure such as the Majuba coal power station (Figure 3).

Competent Persons Statement

Significant Changes in State of Affairs

Significant changes in the state of affairs of the Company during the financial year were as follows:

- In October 2019, the Company issued further unsecured convertible notes with a face value of \$180,000, as part of a capital raising exercise. The convertible notes, including accrued interest of \$5,537, were subsequently converted into ordinary shares in December 2019 at an issue price of \$0.02 per share.
- In November 2019, the Company issued 36,518,022 unlisted options at \$0.001 per option to raise \$36,518. The options are exercisable at \$0.03 per share and expire 31 December 2021.
- In December 2019, following shareholder approval granted at the 2019 Annual General Meeting, the Company issued 7,150,000 ordinary shares at an issue price of \$0.02 per share to a Director related entity in satisfaction of amounts owed in relation to corporate advisory fees owing.
- In February 2020, the Company completed a 1 for 4 Non-Renounceable Entitlement Offer at an issue price of \$0.02 per share. A total of 64,135,945 ordinary shares totalling \$1,282,719 were subsequently issued to shareholders on 3 March 2020.
- During March and April 2020, the Company issued a total of 71,036,038 ordinary shares at an issue price of \$0.02 per share representing shares allotted due to the shortfall from the Entitlement Issue and Placement Offer under the Prospectus. The total proceeds raised from the shortfall issue and placement offer amounted to \$1,420,721.
- During the year ended 30 June 2020, the Company received signed audited accounts of its investment in associate, Afro Energy for years ended 2016 2019, and resolved the Company's concerns surrounding the carrying value of its investment. Based on the audited accounts of Afro Energy and the financial position of that company, the Directors have reinstated the carrying value of its investment in Afro Energy at 1 July 2018 to \$7,717,594. As a result, prior year financial statements were required to be restated to rectify and partly reduce the impairment.

Matters subsequent to the end of the financial year

On 28 July 2020, the Company issued 400,000 ordinary shares upon the exercising of unlisted options by shareholders for a total sum of \$12,000.

On 28 August 2020, the Company obtained shareholder approval at a General Meeting to issue a further 14,967,258 options, on the same terms and conditions as above, to related parties. The issue price is \$0.001 per option.

The full impact of the COVID-19 pandemic continues to evolve at the date of this report. The Company is therefore uncertain as to the full impact that the pandemic will have on its financial condition, liquidity and future results of operations.

No other matters or circumstance has arisen since 30 June 2020 that has affected, or may significantly affect the Company's operations, the results of those operations, or the Company's state of affairs in future financial years.

Likely developments and expected results of operations

As Kinetiko Energy Ltd is listed on the Australian Stock Exchange, it is subject to the continuous disclosure requirements of the ASX Listing Rules which require immediate disclosure to the market of information that is likely to have a material effect on the price or value of Kinetiko Energy Ltd securities.

The information provided in this remuneration report has been audited as required by Section 308(3C) of the Corporations Act 2001.

(a) Principles used to determine the nature and amount of remuneration

The remuneration policy of Kinetiko Energy Ltd has been designed to align director and executive objectives with shareholder and business objectives by providing a fixed remuneration component and offering specific long-term incentives based on key performance areas affecting the company's financial results. The board of Kinetiko Energy Ltd believes the remuneration policy to be appropriate and effective in its ability to attract and retain the best executives and directors to run and manage the company.

The board's policy for determining the nature and amount of remuneration for board members and senior executives of the company is as follows:

The remuneration policy, setting the terms and conditions for the Executive Directors and other senior executives, was developed by the board. All executives receive a base salary (which is based on factors such as length of service and experience) and superannuation. The Board of Directors (Board) reviews executive packages annually by reference to the company's performance, executive performance and comparable information from industry sectors and other listed companies in similar industries.

The Board may exercise discretion in relation to approving incentives, bonuses and options. The policy is designed to attract the highest calibre of executives and reward them for performance that results in long-term growth in shareholder wealth. Executives are also entitled to participate in the employee share and option arrangements.

All remuneration paid to directors and executives is valued at the cost to the company and expensed. Shares given to directors and executives are valued as the difference between the market price of those shares and the amount paid by the director or executive. Options are valued using the Black-Scholes or Binomial methodologies.

The Board policy is to remunerate Non-Executive directors at market rates for comparable companies for time, commitment and responsibilities. The Board determines payments to the Non-Executive directors and reviews their remuneration annually based on market practice, duties and accountability. Independent external advice is sought when required. The maximum aggregate amount of fees that can be paid to Non-Executive directors is subject to approval by shareholders at the annual general meeting (currently \$250,000). Fees for Non-Executive directors are not linked to the performance of the Company. However, to align directors' interests with shareholder interests, the directors are encouraged to hold shares in the company and are able to participate in employee option plans.

The objective of the Company's executive reward framework is set to attract and retain the most qualified and experienced directors and senior executives. The board ensures that executive reward satisfies the following criteria for good reward governance practices:

Company performance, shareholder wealth and Directors' and Executives' remuneration

The remuneration policy has been tailored to increase goal congruence between shareholders and Directors and Executives. This is facilitated through the issue of options or performance rights to Directors and Executives to encourage the alignment of personal and shareholder interests. The qualified audit opinion related to the investment in associate balance that we were unable to obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence to verify the carrying value of the investment because audited financial information of the associate was not available.

As disclosed in Note 1 in the financial report at 30 June 2020, during the year the Company received audited financial information of its investment in associate and have reinstated the previously impaired carrying value of its investment at 1 July 2018.

We considered this a key audit matter due to the significance of the reinstatement of the carrying value of the investment and the risk that we would be unable to obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence to remove the qualified audit opinion from our audit report at 30 June 2020.

How the matter was addressed in our audit

Our procedures included, but were not limited to the following:

- Discussing with management the process and steps taken to identify and quantify the reinstatement of the carrying value of its investment in associate;
- Obtaining and reviewing management's workings relating to the reinstatement of the carrying value of its investment in associate;
- Corroborating the carrying value of the investment balance and the Company's share of equity accounted losses to the audited financial information of the associate;
- Evaluating the Company's impairment assessment of the reinstated investment balance in accordance with the requirements of Australian Accounting Standards; and
- Assessing the adequacy of the related disclosures in Note 1 and Note 10 in the financial report at 30 June 2020.

As a result of the above, this matter has now been resolved and our audit opinion for 30 June 2020 is not modified in respect of this matter.

Carrying Value of Investment in Associate

The company is required to assess whether any impairment indicators are present in accordance with ASAB 128 Investments in Associates and Joint Ventures ("AASB 128") which may indicate the Group's investment in associate is impaired.

We have determined this is a key audit matter given its financial significance to the Group and the judgements and estimates required in assessing the carrying value of the investment.

Basis of preparation

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Except for cash flow information, the financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

Restatement of financial information – Investment in Afro Energy

During the year ended 30 June 2018, based on the lack of information available at the time and the uncertainty surrounding the recoverability value of the investment, the Company resolved that the entire carrying amount of the investment in Afro Energy (Pty) Ltd ('Afro Energy') be impaired.

During the year ended 30 June 2020, the Company received signed audited accounts of its investment in associate, Afro Energy for years ended 2016 - 2019 and resolved the Company's concerns surrounding the carrying value of its investment.

Based on the audited accounts of Afro Energy and the financial position of that company, the Directors have determined that the recoverable amount of its investments was \$7,717,594 rather than zero as recorded in the 30 June 2019 Financial Statements and have therefore reinstated the carrying value of its investment in Afro Energy at 1 July 2018 to \$7,717,594.

As a result, prior year financial statements were required to be restated to rectify this matter and correct the impairment recorded in respect of this investment. Refer to Note 10 for further details.

Going Concern

This report has been prepared on the going concern basis, which contemplates the continuity of normal business activity and the realisation of assets and settlement of liabilities in the normal course of business.

For the year ended 30 June 2020 the Company recorded a loss of \$1,874,159 (2019: \$1,702,128) and had net cash outflows from operating and investing activities of \$2,021,126 (2019: \$1,120,211). At 30 June 2020, the Company had a working capital surplus of \$807,108 (2019: deficit of \$549,027).

The full impact of the COVID-19 pandemic continues to evolve at the date of this report. The Company is therefore uncertain as to the full impact that the pandemic will have on its financial condition, liquidity and future results of operations during 2020. Management continues to actively monitor the global situation and its impact on the Company's financial condition, liquidity, operations, suppliers, industry and workforce. Given the daily evolution of the COVID-19 outbreak and the global responses to curb its spread, the Company is not able to estimate the effects of the COVID-19 outbreak on its results of operations, financial condition or liquidity for the 2020 financial year.

In context of this operating environment, the ability of the Company to continue as a going concern is dependent on securing additional funding through debt or equity to continue to fund its operational and exploration activities.

These conditions indicate a material uncertainty that may cast a significant doubt about the Company's ability to continue as a going concern and, therefore, that it may be unable to realise its assets and discharge its liabilities in the normal course of business.

The financial statements have been prepared on the basis that the Company is a going concern, which contemplates the continuity of normal business activity, realisation of assets and settlement of liabilities in the normal course of business for the following reasons:

- The Company believe they can raise additional funding through debt or equity which is actively pursued;
- The Company has a recent proven history of successfully raising capital;
- The majority of creditors have provided confirmation that they will extend payment terms until such time that the company has the ability to pay; and
- Cash spending can be reduced or slowed below its current rate if required.

Should the Company not be able to continue as a going concern, it may be required to realise its assets and discharge its liabilities other than in the ordinary course of business, and at amounts that differ from those stated in the financial statements. The financial report does not include any adjustments relating to the recoverability and classification of recorded asset amounts or liabilities that might be necessary should the Company not continue as a going concern.

Foreign Currency

The financial statements are presented in Australian dollars, which is the Company's functional and presentation currency.

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation at year-end exchange rates of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognised in the Statement of Profit or Loss and Other Comprehensive Income.

Interest Income

Interest income is recognised on a time proportionate basis that takes into account the effective yield on the financial asset.

Note 3: Segment Information

The Company currently does not have production and is only involved in exploration. As a consequence, activities in the operating segments are identified by management based on the manner in which resources are allocated, the nature of the resources provided and the identity of service line manager and country of expenditure. Discrete financial information about each of these areas is reported to the executive management team on a monthly basis.

Based on the above, management has determined that the company has one operating segment being gas exploration in South Africa. As the Company is focused on gas exploration, the Board monitors the company based on actual versus budgeted exploration expenditure incurred by area of interest. These areas of interest meet aggregating criteria and are aggregated into one reporting sector. This internal reporting framework is the most relevant to assist the Board with making decisions regarding the company and its ongoing exploration activities, while also taking into consideration the results of exploration work that has been performed to date.

Accounting Policy

Operating segments are reported in a manner consistent with the internal reporting to the chief operating decision maker. The chief operating decision maker, who is responsible for allocating resources and assessing performance of the operating segments, has been identified as the Managing Director.

Deferred tax

Deferred tax is accounted for using the comprehensive statement of financial position liability method in respect of temporary differences arising from differences between the carrying amount of assets and liabilities in the financial statements and the corresponding tax base of those items.

In principle, deferred tax liabilities are recognised for all taxable temporary differences. Deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that sufficient taxable amounts will be available against which deductible temporary differences or unused tax losses and tax offsets can be utilised.

However, deferred tax assets and liabilities are not recognised if the temporary differences giving rise to them arise from the initial recognition of assets and liabilities (other than as a result of a business combination) which affects neither taxable income nor accounting profit. Furthermore, a deferred tax liability is not recognised in relation to taxable temporary differences arising from goodwill.

Deferred tax liabilities are recognised for taxable temporary differences arising on investments in subsidiaries, branches, associates and joint ventures except where the entity is able to control the reversal of the temporary differences and it is probable that the temporary differences will not reverse in the foreseeable future. Deferred tax assets arising from deductible temporary differences associated with these investments and interests are only recognised to the extent that it is probable that there will be sufficient taxable profits against which to utilise the benefits of the temporary differences and they are expected to reverse in the foreseeable future.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply to the period(s) when the asset and liability giving rise to them are realised or settled, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted by reporting date. The measurement of deferred tax liabilities and assets reflects the tax consequences that would follow from the manner in which the entity expects, at the reporting date, to recover or settle the carrying amount of its assets and liabilities.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset when they relate to income taxes levied by the same taxation authority and the entity intends to settle its current tax assets and liabilities on a net basis.

Current and deferred tax for the period

Current and deferred tax is recognised as an expense or income in the Statement of Profit or Loss and Other Comprehensive Income, except when it relates to items credited or debited directly to equity, in which case the deferred tax is also recognised directly in equity, or where it arises from the initial accounting for a business combination, in which case it is taken into account in the determination of goodwill or excess.

Key Estimates and Judgements

The Company has not recognised any deferred tax assets or liability in relation to the carrying value of its capitalised exploration and evaluation assets as the Directors do not believe it is capable of being estimated with a sufficient degree of reliability due to uncertainty over the manner in which the carrying value of these assets will be recovered.

(a) Credit risk

Management does not actively manage credit risk.

Cash at bank is held with internationally regulated banks. As at 30 June 2020, all cash and cash equivalents were held with AA rated banks.

Other receivables are of a low value and all amounts are current. There are no trade receivables.

(b) Capital risk

The Company's objectives when managing capital are to safeguard their ability to continue as a going concern, so that they can continue to provide returns for shareholders and benefits for other stakeholders and to maintain an optimal capital structure to reduce the cost of capital. In order to maintain or adjust the capital structure, the Company may adjust the amount of dividends paid to shareholders, return capital to shareholders, issue new shares or sell assets to reduce debt.

During the year ended 30 June 2020, the Company's strategy was to keep borrowings to a minimum. The company's equity management is determined by funds required to undertake exploration activities and meet its corporate and other costs.

(c) Liquidity risk

Maturity profile of financial instruments

Prudent liquidity risk management implies maintaining sufficient cash balances and access to equity funding.

The Company's exposure to the risk of changes in market interest rates relate primarily to cash assets and floating interest rates.

The directors monitor the cash-burn rate of the Company on an on-going basis against budget and the maturity profiles of financial assets and liabilities to manage its liquidity risk.

As at reporting date the Company had sufficient cash reserves to meet its requirements. The Company has no access to credit standby facilities or arrangements for further funding or borrowings in place.

Kinetiko Energy Limited holds a 49% interest in Afro Energy (Pty) Ltd, a joint venture structured as a strategic partnership between the Company and Badimo Gas (Pty) Ltd. The primary purpose of the joint venture is to maximise the long term value of the assets of the joint venture and to secure additional funding from outside sources.

Under the joint venture agreement, the Company has a 49% direct interest in the net assets and share of profit and losses. In addition, pursuant to the joint venture agreement, the Company has 49% of the voting rights in relation to the joint venture.

During the year ended 30 June 2018, based on the lack of information available at the time and the uncertainty surrounding the recoverability value of the investment, the Company resolved that the entire carrying amount of the investment to be impaired. The amount impaired was \$10,652,783 which consisted of loans to Afro Energy of \$2,935,189 and investment component of \$7,717,594.

During the year ended 30 June 2020, the Company received signed audited accounts of Afro Energy (Pty) Ltd for the years ended 2016 – 2019 and resolved its other concerns around the financial position of Afro Energy.

As a result, the financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2019 have been restated to reflect the recoverable amount of the Company's investment in Afro Energy (Pty) Ltd of \$7,717,594. This amount is adjusted for the Company's 49% share of loss incurred for the year ended 30 June 2019 of \$169,113.

During the year ended 30 June 2020, in addition to the Company's investment in associate, the Company continued to increase project expenditure in relation to the tenements held by Afro Energy (Pty) Ltd. Under the equity method, the investment in the associate is carried in the statement of financial position at cost plus post acquisition changes in the Company's share of net assets of the associate. Goodwill relating to an associate is included in the carrying amount of the investment and is not amortised. After application of the equity method, the Company determines whether it is necessary to recognise any additional impairment loss with respect to the Company's net investment in the associate. The income statement reflects the Company's share of the results of operation of the associate.

Where there has been a change recognised directly in the associate's equity, the Company recognises its share of any changes and discloses this in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

Unrealised gains on transactions between the Company and its associates are eliminated to the extent of the Company's interest in the associates. Unrealised losses are also eliminated unless the transaction provides evidence of an impairment of the asset transferred.

At each reporting date, the Company reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. Recoverable amount is the higher of fair value less costs to sell and value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset for which the estimates of future cash flows have not been adjusted.

If the recoverable amount of an asset (or cash-generating unit) is estimated to be less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount of the asset (cash-generating unit) is reduced to its recoverable amount. An impairment loss is recognised in the profit or loss immediately, unless the relevant asset is carried at fair value, in which case the impairment loss is treated as a revaluation decrease.

Employee benefits

Provision is made for benefits accruing to employees in respect of wages and salaries, superannuation, annual leave, and sick leave when it is probable that settlement will be required and they are capable of being measured reliably.

Provisions made in respect of employee benefits which are not expected to be settled within 12 months are measured as the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made by the entity in respect of services provided by employees up to reporting date.

Goods and services tax

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except:

- where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the taxation authority, it is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of an asset or as part of an item of expense; or
- ii) for receivables and payables which are recognised inclusive of GST.

The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is included as part of receivables or payables.

Cash flows are included in the cash flow statement on a gross basis. The GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which is recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is classified as operating cash flows.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Company has a present obligation, the future sacrifice of economic benefits is probable, and the amount of the provision can be measured reliably.

The amount recognised as a provision is the best estimate of the consideration required to settle the present obligation at reporting date, taking into account the risks and uncertainties surrounding the obligation. Where a provision is measured using the cash flows estimated to settle the present obligation, its carrying amount is the present value of those cash flows.

When some or all of the economic benefits required to settle a provision are expected to be recovered from a third party, the receivable is recognised as an asset if it is virtually certain that recovery will be received and the amount of the receivable can be measured reliably.

Leases

The Company assesses at the start of a contract whether or not it contains a lease, by deciding if the contract provides the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration.

The Company currently uses a single recognition and measurement approach for all leases, except for short-term leases and leases of low value assets. The Company recognises lease liabilities to make lease payments and right-of-use assets representing the right to use underlying assets.

Note 21: Other Accounting Policies (continued)

i) Right-of-use assets

The Company recognises right-of-use assets at the start of the lease and are measured at costs, less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses and adjusted for any remeasurement of lease liabilities. The cost of right-of-use assets includes the amount of lease liabilities recognised, initial direct costs incurred and lease payments made at or before the commencement date less any lease incentives received. Right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the shorter of the lease term and the estimated useful lives of the assets.

ii) Lease liabilities

At the commencement date of the lease, the Company recognises lease liabilities measured at the present value of lease payments to be made over the lease term. The lease payments include fixed payments less any lease incentives received, variable lease payments that depend on an index or a rate and amounts expected to be paid under residual value guarantees. The lease payments also include the exercise price of a purchase option reasonably certain to be exercised by the Company and payments of penalties for terminating the lease, if the lease term reflects the Company exercising the option to terminate. Variable lease payments that do not depend on an index or a rate are recognised as expenses (unless they are incurred to produce inventories) in the period in which the event or condition that triggers the payment occurs.

In calculating the present value of lease payments, the Company uses its incremental borrowing rate at the lease commencement date because the interest rate implicit in the lease is not readily determinable. After the commencement date, the amount of lease liabilities is increased to reflect the accretion of interest and reduced for the lease payments made. In addition, the carrying amount of lease liabilities is remeasured if there is a modification, a change in the lease term, a change in the lease payments (e.g. changes to future payments resulting from a change in an index or rate used to determine such payments) or a change in the assessment of an option to purchase the underlying asset.

iii) Short-term leases and leases of low-value assets

The Company applies the short-term lease recognition exemption to its short-term leases that have a lease term of 12 months or less from the commencement date and do not contain a purchase option. It also applies the lease of low-value assets recognition exemption to leases that are considered to be low value. Lease payments on short-term leases and leases of low-value assets are recognised as an expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

New and Amended Standards and Interpretations adopted

For the year ended 30 June 2020, the Company has reviewed all of the new and revised Standards and Interpretations issued by the AASB that are relevant to its operations and effective for annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 July 2019.

As a result of new or amended standards which became applicable for the current reporting period, the Company has adopted AASB 16 *Leases* from 1 July 2019. The impact of the adoption of AASB 16 on the Company's financial statements is disclosed below.

Note 21: Other Accounting Policies (continued)

AASB 16 Leases - Impact of Adoption

The Company's adoption of AASB 16 from 1 July 2019 has resulted in no material changes in accounting policies and has not had a material impact on the amounts presented in the Company's financial statements.

Following the Company's review of all its leases which may have been affected by AASB 16 from 1 July 2019, the Company has identified that although the leasing of office premises is subject to AASB 16, as the lease is on a month-to-month tenancy arrangement, the Company has applied the short-term lease recognition exemption. Therefore no adjustments are required to the amounts recognised in the financial statements.

Principle 1: Lay solid foundations for management and oversight

Recommendation 1.1

The Company has established the respective roles and responsibilities of its Board and management, and those matters expressly reserved to the Board and those delegated to management, and has documented this in its Board Charter.

The responsibilities of the Board include but are not limited to:

- (a) setting and reviewing strategic direction and planning;
- (b) reviewing financial and operational performance:
- (c) identifying principal risks and reviewing risk management strategies; and
- (d) considering and reviewing significant capital investments and material transactions.

In exercising its responsibilities, the Board recognises that there are many stakeholders in the operations of the Company, including employees, shareholders, co-ventures, the government and the community.

The Board has delegated responsibility for the business operations of the Company to the Chief Executive Officer (currently the Joint Managing Directors). The Chief Executive Officer is accountable to the Board.

Recommendation 1.2

The Company undertakes appropriate checks before appointing a person, or putting forward to shareholders a candidate for election as a director and provides shareholders with all material information in its possession relevant to a decision on whether or not to elect a director.

The checks which are undertaken, and the information provided to shareholders, are set out in the Company's Remuneration and Nomination Committee Charter.

Recommendation 1.3

The Company has a written agreement with each of the Directors and senior executives setting out the terms of their appointment. The material terms of any employment, service or consultancy agreement the Company, or any of its child entities, has entered into with its Chief Executive Officer, any of its directors, and any other person or entity who is a related party of the Chief Executive Officer or any of its directors will be disclosed in accordance with ASX Listing Rule 3.16.4 (taking into consideration the exclusions from disclosure outlined in that rule).

Recommendation 1.4

The Company Secretary is accountable directly to the Board, through the Chair, on all matters to do with the proper functioning of the Board. The Company Secretary is responsible for the application of best practice in corporate governance and also supports the effectiveness of the Board by:

- (a) ensuring a good flow of information between the Board, its committees, and Directors;
- (b) monitoring policies and procedures of the Board;
- (c) advising the Board through the Chairman of corporate governance policies; and
- (d) conducting and reporting matters of the Board, including the despatch of Board agendas, briefing papers and minutes.

Recommendation 1.5

The Company has a Diversity Policy, the purpose of which is:

- (a) to outline the Company's commitment to creating a corporate culture that embraces diversity and, in particular, focuses on the composition of its Board and senior management; and
- (b) to provide a process for the Board to determine measurable objectives and procedures which the Company will implement and report against to achieve its diversity goals.

The Board intends to set measurable objectives for achieving diversity, specifically including gender diversity and will review and report on the effectiveness and relevance of these measurable objectives. However, due to the current size of the Board and management, these measurable objectives have not yet been set.

Recommendation 1.6

The Chair will be responsible for evaluating the performance of the Board, Board committees and individual directors in accordance with the process disclosed in the Company's Board performance evaluation policy.

This policy is to ensure:

- (a) individual Directors and the Board as a whole work efficiently and effectively in achieving their functions;
- (b) the executive Directors and key executives execute the Company's strategy through the efficient and effective implementation of the business objectives; and
- (c) committees to which the Board has delegated responsibilities are performing efficiently and effectively in accordance with the duties and responsibilities set out in the board charter.

This policy will be reviewed annually.

During the reporting period, an evaluation of the Board, its committees and individual directors has not taken place in accordance with the Company's policy, however a review is currently being completed.

Recommendation 1.7

The Chief Executive Officer will be responsible for evaluating the performance of the Company's senior executives in accordance with the process disclosed in the Company's Process for Performance Evaluations, which is currently being developed by the Board.

The Chair will be responsible for evaluating the performance of the Company's Chief Executive Officer in accordance with the process disclosed in the Company's Process for Performance Evaluations, which is currently being developed by the Board.

Due to the current size of the Board and management, the Company does not have a Chief Executive Officer and accordingly an evaluation has not been conducted.

Principle 2: Structure the board to add value

Recommendation 2.1

Due to the size of the Board, the Company does not have a separate nomination committee. The roles and responsibilities of a nomination committee are currently undertaken by the Board.

The duties of the full Board in its capacity as a nomination committee are set out in the Company's Remuneration and Nomination Committee Charter which is available on the Company's website.

When the Board meets as a remuneration and nomination committee is carries out those functions which are delegated to it in the Company's Remuneration and Nomination Committee Charter. Items that are usually required to be discussed by a Remuneration and Nomination Committee are marked as separate agenda items at Board meetings when required.

The Board has adopted a Remuneration and Nomination Committee Charter which describes the role, composition, functions and responsibilities of a Nomination Committee and is disclosed on the Company's website.

Recommendation 2.2

The mix of skills and diversity which the Board is looking to achieve in its composition is:

- (a) a broad range of business experience; and
- (b) technical expertise and skills required to discharge duties.

Recommendation 2.3

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The Board considers the independence of directors having regard to the relationships listed in Box 2.3 of the Principles and Recommendations.

Currently the Board is structured as follows:

- (a) Adam Sierakowski (Non-executive Chairman);
- (b) James Searle (Non-Executive Director); and
- (c) Geoff Michael (Non-Executive Director).

The Chairman, Mr Adam Sierakowski has been a director of the Company since 8 December 2010. He is a director and shareholder of Trident, a provider of material professional services, and accordingly, is not independent. Dr James Searle and Mr Geoff Michael have been directors of the Company since 25 January 2010.

Recommendation 2.4

Currently, the Board considers that membership weighted towards relevant expertise is appropriate at this stage of the Company's operations. Accordingly, the Board does not have a majority of independent directors.

Recommendation 2.5

As noted above, Mr Sierakowski is not an independent Chairman. Mr Sierakowski is considered to be the most appropriate person to Chair the Board because of his public company experience.

Recommendation 2.6

It is a policy of the Company, that new Directors undergo an induction process in which they are given a full briefing on the Company.

In order to achieve continuing improvement in Board performance, all Directors are encouraged to undergo continual professional development. Specifically, Directors are provided with the resources and training to address skills gaps where they are identified.

Principle 3: Act ethically and responsibly

Recommendation 3.1

The Company is committed to promoting good corporate conduct grounded by strong ethics and responsibility. The Company has established a Code of Conduct (Code), which addresses matters relevant to the Company's legal and ethical obligations to its stakeholders. It may be amended from time to time by the Board, and is disclosed on the Company's website.

The Code applies to all Directors, employees, contractors and officers of the Company.

The Code will be formally reviewed by the Board each year.

Principle 4: Safeguard integrity in corporate reporting

Recommendation 4.1

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Due to the size of the Board, the Company does not have a separate Audit Committee. The roles and responsibilities of an audit committee are undertaken by the Board.

The full Board in its capacity as the audit committee is responsible for reviewing the integrity of the Company's financial reporting and overseeing the independence of the external auditors. The duties of the full Board in its capacity as the audit committee are set out in the Company's Audit Committee Charter which is available on the Company's website.

When the Board meets as an audit committee is carries out those functions which are delegated to it in the Company's Audit Committee Charter. Items that are usually required to be discussed by an Audit Committee are marked as separate agenda items at Board meetings when required.

The Board is responsible for the initial appointment of the external auditor and the appointment of a new external auditor when any vacancy arises. Candidates for the position of external auditor must demonstrate complete independence from the Company through the engagement period. The Board may otherwise select an external auditor based on criteria relevant to the Company's business and circumstances. The performance of the external auditor is reviewed on an annual basis by the Board.

The Board has adopted an Audit Committee Charter which describes the role, composition, functions and responsibilities of the Audit Committee and is disclosed on the Company's website.

Recommendation 4.2

Before the Board approves the Company financial statements for each financial period it will receive from the Chief Executive Officer and the Chief Financial Officer or equivalent a declaration that, in their opinion, the financial records of the Company for the relevant financial period have been properly maintained and that the financial statements for the relevant financial period comply with the appropriate accounting standards and give a true and fair view of the financial position and performance of the Company and the consolidated entity and that the opinion has been formed on the basis of a sound system of risk management and internal control which is operating effectively.

Recommendation 4.3

Under section 250RA of the Corporations Act, the Company's auditor is required to attend the Company's annual general meeting at which the audit report is considered, and does not arrange to be represented by a person who is a suitably qualified member of the audit team that conducted the audit and is in a position to answer questions about the audit. Each year, the Company will write to the Company's auditor to inform them of the date of the Company's annual general meeting. In accordance with section 250S of the Corporations Act, at the Company's annual general meeting where the Company's auditor or their representative is at the meeting, the Chair will allow a reasonable opportunity for the members as a whole at the meeting to ask the auditor (or its representative) questions relevant to the conduct of the audit; the preparation and content of the auditor's report; the accounting policies adopted by the Company in relation to the preparation of the financial statements; and the independence of the auditor in relation to the conduct of the audit. The Chair will also allow a reasonable opportunity for the auditor (or their representative) to answer written questions submitted to the auditor under section 250PA of the Corporations Act.

Principle 5: Make timely and balanced disclosure

Recommendation 5.1

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The Company is committed to:

- (a) ensuring that shareholders and the market are provided with full and timely information about its activities;
- (b) complying with the continuous disclosure obligations contained in the Listing Rules and the applicable sections of the Corporations Act; and
- (c) providing equal opportunity for all stakeholders to receive externally available information issued by the Company in a timely manner.

The Company has adopted a Disclosure Policy, which is disclosed on the Company's website. The Disclosure Policy sets out policies and procedures for the Company's compliance with its continuous disclosure obligations under the ASX Listing Rules, and addresses financial markets communication, media contact and continuous disclosure issues. It forms part of the Company's corporate policies and procedures and is available to all staff.

The Chief Executive Officer manages the policy. The policy will develop over time as best practice and regulations change and the Company Secretary will be responsible for communicating any amendments. This policy will be reviewed by the Board annually.

Principle 6: Respect the rights of security holders

Recommendation 6.1

The Company provides information about itself and its governance to investors via its website at www.kinetiko.com.au. The Company is committed to maintaining a Company website with general information about the Company and its operations and information specifically targeted at keeping the Company's shareholders informed about the Company. In particular, where appropriate, after confirmation of receipt by ASX, the following will be posted to the Company website:

- (a) relevant announcements made to the market via ASX;
- (b) media releases;
- (c) investment updates;
- (d) Company presentations and media briefings;
- (e) copies of press releases and announcements for the preceding three years; and
- (f) copies of annual and half yearly reports including financial statements for the preceding three years.

Recommendation 6.2

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The Company has a Shareholder Communication and Investor Relations Policy which aims to ensure that Shareholders are informed of all major developments of the Company. The policy is disclosed on the Company's website.

Information is communicated to Shareholders via:

- (a) reports to Shareholders;
- (b) ASX announcements;
- (c) annual general meetings; and
- (d) the Company website.

This Shareholder Communication and Investor Relations policy will be formally reviewed by the Board each year. While the Company aims to provide sufficient information to Shareholders about the Company and its activities, it understands that Shareholders may have specific questions and require additional information. To ensure that Shareholders can obtain all relevant information to assist them in exercising their rights as Shareholders, the Company has made available a telephone number and relevant contact details (via the website) for Shareholders to make their enquiries.

Recommendation 6.3

The Board encourages full participation of Shareholders at meetings to ensure a high level of accountability and identification with the Company's strategies and goals.

However, due to the size and nature of the Company, the Board does not consider a policy outlining the policies and processes that it has in place to facilitate and encourage participating at meetings of shareholders to be appropriate at this stage.

Recommendation 6.4

Shareholders are given the option to receive communications from, and send communication to, the Company and its share registry electronically. To ensure that shareholders can obtain all relevant information to assist them in exercising their rights as shareholders, the Company has made available a telephone number and relevant contact details (via the website) for shareholders to make their enquiries.

Principle 7: Recognise and manage risk

Recommendation 7.1

Due to the size of the Board, the Company does not have a separate Risk Committee. The Board is responsible for the oversight of the Company's risk management and control framework.

When the Board meets as a risk committee is carries out those functions which are delegated to it in the Company's Audit Committee Charter. Items that are usually required to be discussed by a Risk Committee are marked as separate agenda items at Board meetings when required.

The Board has adopted an Audit Committee Charter which describes the role, composition, functions and responsibilities in relation to the risk management system of the Audit Committee and is disclosed on the Company's website.

The Board has adopted a Risk Management Policy, which is disclosed on the Company's website. Under the policy, responsibility and control of risk management is delegated to the appropriate level of management within the Company with the Chief Executive Officer having ultimate responsibility to the Board for the risk management and control framework.

The risk management system covers:

- (a) operational risk;
- (b) financial reporting;
- (c) compliance / regulations; and
- (d) system / IT process risk.

A risk management model is also being developed and will provide a framework for systematically understanding and identifying the types of business risks threatening the Company as a whole, or specific business activities within the Company.

Recommendation 7.2

The Board will review the Company's risk management framework annually to satisfy itself that it continues to be sound, to determine whether there have been any changes in the material business risks the Company faces and to ensure that the Company is operating within the risk appetite set by the Board.

- (a) Arrangements put in place by the Board to monitor risk management include, but are not limited to:
- (b) monthly reporting to the Board in respect of operations and the financial position of the Company; and
- (c) quarterly rolling forecasts prepared;

Recommendation 7.3

The Company does not have, and does not intend to establish, an internal audit function. To evaluate and continually improve the effectiveness of the Company's risk management and internal control processes, the Board relies on ongoing reporting and discussion of the management of material business risks as outlined in the Company's Risk Management Policy.

Recommendation 7.4

Given the speculative nature of the Company's business, it is subject to general risks and certain specific risks.

The Company will identify and monitor those economic, environmental and/or social sustainability risks to which it has a material exposure, and disclosed how it intends to manage those risks.

Principle 8: Remunerate fairly and responsibly

Recommendation 8.1

Due to the size of the Board, the Company does not have a separate remuneration committee. The roles and responsibilities of a remuneration committee are currently undertaken by the Board.

The duties of the full board in its capacity as a remuneration committee are set out in the Company's Remuneration and Nomination Committee Charter which is available on the Company's website

When the Board meets as a remuneration committee is carries out those functions which are delegated to it in the Company's Remuneration and Nomination Committee Charter. Items that are usually required to be discussed by a Remuneration Committee are marked as separate agenda items at Board meetings when required.

The Board has adopted a Remuneration and Nomination Committee Charter which describes the role, composition, functions and responsibilities of the Remuneration Committee and is disclosed on the Company's website.

Recommendation 8.2

Details of the Company's policies on remuneration will be set out in the Company's "Remuneration Report" in each Annual Report published by the Company. This disclosure will include a summary of the Company's policies regarding the deferral of performance-based remuneration and the reduction, cancellation or clawback of the performance-based remuneration in the event of serious misconduct or a material misstatement in the Company's financial statements.

Recommendation 8.3

The Company's Security Trading Policy includes a statement on the Company's policy on prohibiting participants in the Company's Employee Incentive Plan entering into transactions (whether through the use of derivatives or otherwise) which limit the economic risk of participating in the Employee Incentive Plan.

Security Trading Policy

In accordance with ASX Listing Rule 12.9, the Company has adopted a trading policy which sets out the following information:

- (a) closed periods in which directors, employees and contractors of the Company must not deal in the Company's securities;
- (b) trading in the Company's securities which is not subject to the Company's trading policy; and
- (c) the procedures for obtaining written clearance for trading in exceptional circumstances.

The Company's Security Trading Policy is available on the Company's website.
